

Virginia Geography



Products & Industries by Region

The <u>Coastal Plain</u> is where we find many rivers that flow into the Chesapeake Bay. It also borders the Atlantic Ocean. This area is known for having some of the best crabs, fish, and oysters in the country. Seafood is a very profitable product for the State of Virginia. Another product that comes from this region is peanuts. Peanuts produced here are often times referred to as the best peanuts in the country!

The Tidewater, being next to the ocean makes for a perfect place for shipbuilding. Tourism is also a big part of the economy because of our beautiful beaches and historical sights.

The military helps to create many jobs. Here, we will find many important bases, including Langley Air Force Base and Quantico.

The <u>Piedmont</u> is still a leading producer of Virginia's original <u>cash crop</u>, Tobacco. Today, Virginia's cash crops include soybeans, corn, tomatoes, and apples. Additionally, the Piedmont has a large farming industry. The Piedmont is also home to informational technology and computer programming. We can find some of the world's best cybersecurity agencies. A lot of people in Northern Virginia work for the federal government because we are so close to Washington, DC. Many state workers are located near Richmond which is our capital city.

The <u>Blue Ridge Mountain</u> region also has a large agricultural area. Farmers grow apples and many other products. Families enjoy traveling to this region to enjoy visiting orchards, hiking, and just to see the beautiful views of the mountains.

The <u>Valley and Ridge</u> region also has a large farming industry. Here, livestock and livestock products are made, such as milk. Our state's most valuable source of agricultural income comes from livestock and livestock products.

The <u>Appalachian Plateau</u> is best known for its coal industry. Coal was often used to power factories and heat homes. Most recently, we have seen a decline in the use of coal because of the negative effects on air quality.
