Second Assignment: Making Inferences using Myths

Let's Review – What is an inference?

An inference is a conclusion reached based on evidence from the passage and what we already know. An inference is not directly stated in the passage.

Examples:

Maria walked out of the room slamming the door behind her.

Inference – Maria is upset.

The author did not tell us this, but we can infer it based on evidence and what we know.

Evidence – She slams the door.

What we know – When someone slams a door they are usually angry.

Another Example:

Despite the fact Abdul didn't make the basketball team, he continued to practice daily.

Inference – Abdul is determined.

The author did not tell us this, but we can infer it based on evidence and what we know.

Evidence – He continued to practice even though he didn't make the basketball team.

What we know: People who are determined to make something happen never give up.

Now it is your turn. Read Atalanta's Run and fill out the graphic organizer below. The first is already done for you.

Evidence	What can we infer?
Atalanta feared a husband would tie her down.	Atalanta is independent.
Atalanta could not be beaten.	
More young men were racing to their death.	
When Atalanta saw Hippomenes her heart danced and sang.	
Aphrodite did not want Hippomenes to die nor did she want Atalanta to remain unwed.	
Hippomenes pushed himself until his muscles were screaming in pain.
